THE CATHOLIC ENGLISH MASS IN MADEIRA:

Welcome to the Chapel of Our Lady of Penha de França! Father Bernardino Andrade is our English mass priest and will be celebrating Mass for us this morning. The 11h30 Mass will be celebrated in Portuguese by Father Vitor Sousa. This small chapel was founded by Antonio Dantas in 1622. Originally built to minister to the soldiers of the small garrison at the Pontinha Redoubt (stronghold) in the bay of Funchal, the Chapel soon became so famous a shrine that people came to it on pilgrimage from all parts of the Island. In 1935 the Franciscans founded the Franciscan Residence of Our Lady of Penha de França here, at the request of Bishop D. Antonio Ribeiro. In 2015 the Franciscans moved to the former convent of São Bernardino in the town of Câmara de Lobos, and the Chapel reverted back to the Diocese of Funchal. The nave roof and the ceiling were repaired and restored a few years ago through the generosity of a frequent visitor to our English Mass. The Diocese has also recently done some repairs in the social hall, and fixed the 3 bells in the Chapel's bell tower. More repairs are urgently needed to preserve the beauty of this Chapel.





(Job 7: 1-4, 6-7; Psalm 146(147):1-6; 1 Cor 9: 16-19, 22-23; Mark 1: 29-39)

In this Wisdom Book, the blameless Job laments his sufferings at great length. The Lord allowed Satan to afflict Job any way he chose, except death. Today's reading describes the drudgery that many people see in their lives, with only death to look forward to. Job refuses to curse God, but challenges God to say what he has done to deserve these sufferings. Then he accepts that "I have dealt

with great things that ... I cannot know". But Job's challenge is not answered. The psalm sings the praises of God who restored Israel to Jerusalem after their exile, and who sustains the needy. Our readings from Paul's letter to the Corinthians have omitted a long argument that Christians should not behave in a way that might be a stumbling block to others. Today Paul gives an example: he does not claim justifiable payments for spreading the gospel in case people doubt his motives - and so doubt the gospel message. In Mark's gospel the demoniac was healed by word, now Jesus heals Simon's mother-in-law by touch – well enough for her to get supper immediately. Jesus heals many more, but again the demons are not allowed to say who Jesus is - Jesus cannot be understood until the Cross demonstrates God's infinitely merciful love for mankind.

Today I took my IPhone and "pretended" that I knew something about technology. Believe it or not it worked.

I asked the Siri for "How many Portuguese People are in California"? The answer was: In California there are 79.572 Portuguese people.

The Portuguese Community in California has always been very large. And the Portuguese, like the other ethnic migrant communities, wherever they go, they take with them their language, their traditions, their culture, their food, their dances and, especially, their faith. For this reason it is common to find, in a few cities, Catholic Churches built by the Portuguese to practice their faith. One of the examples is the Five Wounds Church in the city of San Jose with its beautiful old



architecture, built over 100 years ago. This church became a Parish Church and from the beginning has always had a Portuguese Priest as its Pastor who would say Mass, preside to the Sacraments and Funerals and also all other services in Portuguese, even if it was also available for other languages especially the English language.

There was a time when there was no Portuguese Priest available to continue that tradition. The Bishop assigned an American priest to be the pastor of the Five Wounds Portuguese Parish.

One day I visited the Five Wounds Church and spent some time talking with the American Pastor who was presiding to a Portuguese Community

without knowing how to speak the language.

That's when he told me about the way the Bishop approached him for this assignment. He said that he had reacted to the Bishop saying:

- But, Bishop I don't know how to speak any Portuguese and that is a big responsibility. I don't feel prepared for that job. What am I going to do when they need me?

The Bishop answered:

- "Just love them". It worked.



SAINT OF THE MONTH: February - Saint Polycarp of Smyrna



Saint Polycarp is a lesser known Catholic Saint, although arguably one of the most influential. He was Bishop of Smyrna and one of the foremost leaders of the Christian Church in the second century. Of particular interest to later scholars is that as a disciple of Saint John the Evangelist he sat at the feet of the Apostles and heard from their own lips eyewitness accounts of the life of Jesus and his teachings.

Sadly, he met with opposition once the Apostles died and their firsthand accounts of Jesus and his teachings were no longer available. Heresies arose, persecution was relentless and there were endless controversies over the correct form of the liturgy. Inevitably, Polycarp

suffered martyrdom and was burnt at the stake for refusing to recant his beliefs.

WORLD DAY OF THE SICK - February 11th 2018



Next Sunday is World Day of the Sick. This was initiated by Pope John Paul II in 1992 to encourage people to pray for those who suffer from illness, and for their caregivers. The Pope himself had been diagnosed with Parkinson's a year before, in 1991, and it is considered that his own illness was impetus for his designation of the day. Every year the pope sets a theme for the World Day of the Sick.

The theme for this year is provided by the words that Jesus spoke from the Cross to Mary, his Mother: "Woman, behold your son" and to John: "Behold your mother". And from that hour the disciple took her into his home" (Jn 19:26-27). The day also coincides with the commemoration of the Feast day of Our Lady of Lourdes.

In a short period of time we created partnerships with supermarket chains and restaurants; we have paid dozens of medical prescriptions, we have spent gallons and gallons of petrol riding across the island giving lifts, we have prevented families from going hungry, getting their electricity cut off, running out of gas, losing their homes. We have tried to keep them warm, keep them hopeful, and keep them dreaming...

The Mission Statement of People Helping People is... through social solidarity, to mobilize many people to help many people in a combat against poverty, hunger, illness, exclusion, indifference, intolerance, and social injustice, with a special preference for the last, the least and the lost, having as a model the person of Jesus, the «Good Shepherd» (Gospel according to Luke, chapter 15). Our wish is that it may always be an open door when all the other doors close, building in this way, different feelings and acts of Mercy (Gospel according to Luke, chapter 6 and Matthew chapter 25).
