The Chapel of Our Lady of Penha de França was founded by Antonio Dantas in 1622, and originally built to minister to the soldiers of the small garrison at the Pontinha Redoubt (stronghold) in the bay of Funchal, but the Chapel soon became so famous a shrine that people came to it on pilgrimage from all



parts of the Island. In 1721 the chapel was restored and enlarged. When the Diocese of Funchal took possession of the chapel it was used as the Bishop's Summer Residence for many years. In the meantime, the Franciscans had been coming to Madeira to carry out apostolic duties, and in 1935, they founded the Franciscan Residence of Our Lady of Penha de França here, at the request of Bishop D. Antonio Ribeiro. In 2015 the Franciscans moved to the former convent of São Bernardino in the town of Câmara de Lobos, and the Chapel reverted back to the Diocese of Funchal. Over the years it has been necessary to carry out repair work inside the Chapel, which was made possible through the generosity of a frequent visitor to our English Mass. At the moment, repair work is again taking place on the ceiling above the altar as it was in danger of falling down.

We are blessed by the presence of two dedicated priests here at Penha de França: Father Bernardino, who celebrates the English Mass every Sunday morning at 10h00, and Father Vitor who celebrates Mass in Portuguese at 11h30.

### **TODAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS**

1<sup>st</sup> Reading – Deuteronomy 5: 12-15 2<sup>nd</sup> Reading – 2 Corinthians 4: 6-11

Gospel - Mark 2:23-3:6

In Portugal and some other countries, the Feast of the Body and Blood of Christ falls on the Thursday after the Most Holy Trinity Sunday. This is what happened in Madeira on Thursday, which was a religious holiday on the island. Masses celebrating the Feast of the Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi) were held in all the churches, and there was also a procession in the streets of Funchal. In some other countries like the United Kingdom, the Feast is not celebrated on the Thursday, but is moved forward to the Sunday after the Most Holy Trinity (today). That's why this Sunday, in Portugal and here at Penha de França, today we are going to celebrate the 9th Sunday of the Ordinary Time and not the Body and Bood of Christ.

### **TODAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS**

Scripture Readings 3rd June 2018, 9th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year B

Deut 5: 12-15;

Psalm 80(81): 3-8, 10-11;

2 Cor 4: 6-11; Mark 2:23 - 3: 6

The book of Deuteronomy, the "second law", expanded and clarified the Jewish Law given to Moses on Sinai. Here the requirement to keep the Sabbath is explained: the day was to be set aside – made holy – for remembering all that the Lord had done for them. The psalm recalls their rescue from Egypt. But this commandment also wise counsel: people – and animals – need to rest, both to regain their strength and to reflect on other important aspects of life.

Continuing his reflections on the nature of ministry, Paul accepts that ministers are weak, fallible human beings. But entrusting the treasure of the gospel to such weak easily destroyed vessels, misleads the world about its importance. The gospel is the true word of God, and survives in spite of these difficulties. The sufferings of Christian ministers show Christ's sufferings to the world: the light of truth comes out of the darkness of their distress. Paul's sufferings are balanced by the flourishing Corinthian church. Ministers afflictions are real, but they are sustained by the hope of resurrection.

Jesus continues his teaching in Galilee with two examples, a healing and from the Jewish scriptures. As Deuteronomy made clear, the Sabbath was made for the benefit of humanity. Its observance is to be for our benefit, it is not meant to be a set of anonymous rules.

The Vietnamese Jesuit, Joseph Nguyen-Cong Doan, who spent nine years in labour camps in Vietnam, relates how he was finally able to say Mass when a fellow priest-prisoner shared some of his own smuggled supplies. "That night, when the other prisoners were asleep, lying on the floor of my cell, I celebrated Mass with tears of joy. My altar was my blanket, my prison clothes my vestments. #### 3 COMMUNION ON THE MOON

The Lord's Supper ensures that we can remember Jesus from any place. Apollo 11 landed on the moon on Sunday, July 20, 1969. Most remember astronaut Neil Armstrong's first words as he stepped onto the moon's surface: "That's one small step for man, one giant leap for mankind." But few know about the first meal eaten on the moon. Dennis Fisher reports that Buzz Aldrin, the NASA Astronaut, had taken aboard the spacecraft a tiny pyx provided by his Catholic pastor. Aldrin sent a radio broadcast to Earth asking listeners to contemplate the events of the day and give thanks. Then, blacking out the broadcast for privacy, Aldrin read, "I am the vine, you are the branches. He who abides in Me, and I in him, bears much fruit." Then, silently, he gave thanks for their successful journey to the moon and received Jesus in the Holy Eucharist, surrendering moon to Jesus. Next, he descended on the moon and walked on it with Neil Armstrong. (Dan Gulley: "Communion on the Moon": Our Daily Bread: June/July/August 2007).

His actions remind us that in the Lord's Supper, God's children can share the life of Jesus

from any place on Earth — and even from the moon. God is everywhere, and our worship should reflect this reality.

In Psalm 139 we are told that wherever we go, God is intimately present with us.

Buzz Aldrin celebrated that experience on the surface of the moon. Thousands of miles from earth, he took time to commune with the One who created, redeemed, and established fellowship with him. (Dennis Fisher)

We have tried to keep them warm, keep them hopeful, and keep them dreaming...

The Mission Statement of People Helping People is... through social solidarity, to mobilize many people to help many people in a combat against poverty, hunger, illness, exclusion, indifference, intolerance, and social injustice, with a special preference for the last, the least and the lost, having as a model the person of Jessus, the «Good Shepherd» (Gospel according to Luke, chapter 15). Our wish is that it may always be an open door when all the other doors close, building in this way, different feelings and acts of Mercy (Gospel according to Luke, chapter 6 and Matthew chapter 25).
