TODAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS



(Ezekiel 2: 2-5; Psalm 122(123); 2 Cor 12: 7-10; Mark 6: 1-6)

Ezekiel was a priest in the Jewish exile to Babylon in 597 BC. Like all prophets, including Christ and Paul, Ezekiel suffered for speaking truth to those who did not want to hear it. Here he is commissioned to speak the Lord's words to Israel – "whether they listen or not". **The psalm** begs the Lord to have mercy on the people,

who are suffering humiliating contempt by others.

The last three chapters of Paul's second letter to the **Corinthians**, perhaps a separate letter, contains an impassioned defence against allegations that he was weak, and less committed because he earned his own living. Paul compares his suffering to Christ's, whose sufferings bring believers to accept suffering as the way to the Kingdom. We can only speculate about Paul's "stake in the flesh". But it clearly caused bodily pain, sometimes, as in Galatia, keeping him from his work of spreading the gospel. And it brought humility instead of the pride he might have had from his successful work. But this very weakness was a continual reminder of his apostolic task. In **Mark's Gospel** Jesus, too, finds his words are not listened to, even "among his own relations" and family. Although the later Gospels soften this rejection, it is clear Jesus found it painful.

« Nonsense », said the first, « There is no life after delivery. What kind of life would that be? ».

The first replied: « Nonsense. And moreover, if there is life, then why has no one ever come back from there? Delivery is the end of life, and in the after-delivery there is nothing but darkness and silence and oblivion. It takes nowhere. ».

«Well, I don't know, » said the second, «but certainly we will meet Mother and she will take care of us. ».

The first replied «Mother? You actually believe in Mother? That's laughable. If Mother exists then where is She now? ».

The second said: «She is all around us. We are surrounded by her. We are of Her. It is in Her that we live. Without Her this world would not and could not exist. ».

«Well I don't see her, so it is only logical that she doesn't exist», said the first, to which the second replied: «Sometimes, when you're in silence and you focus and listen, you can hear Her loving voice, calling down from above. ».

Sometimes we are like the two babies in the story, and we ask: "Is there life after death?"... "Does God exist?"

I have heard that even though birds are surrounded by air, they don't see the air.



Fish are surrounded by water, but the last thing they see is the water. We are so immersed in God. We are completely soaked in God like a sponge with water. We are completely surrounded by God like babies by their mother's wombs, like birds by air and fish by water but we are so distracted by the «life» and the «needs» created by us that we take the risk of even saying and feeling that God doesn't exist unless like the second baby says «Sometimes, when you are in silence and focus and listen we can hear HIS loving voice, calling down from above».

IS THIS CAVE THE PLACE WHERE ST. PETER CELEBRATED MASS?

The "grotto of St. Peter" in Antioch is considered one of the first churches of Christianity. In Chapter 11 of the Acts of the Apostles it says that Antioch was the city in which, for the first time, the disciples of Jesus were called "Christians". Tradition has enthroned Peter as the founder of the Church of Antioch, following the narration in the Book of Acts, which tells of the arrival of Peter and Barnabas to the Turkish city, and also of their preaching there. Traditionally it is

believed that it was in the *Knisset Mar Semaan Kefa* ("Grotto of St. Peter" in Aramaic) where Peter celebrated the Eucharist for this community. Located in one of the slopes of Mount Starius, the cave has a depth of just 13m (42 ft.), a width of 9.5m (31 ft.) and a height of 7m (23 ft.) from floor to ceiling. **The oldest parts of the building we see**

today, built around the original cave dug in the mountain, are from the 4th and 5th centuries, and include a series of mosaic floors and a few frescoes which have been preserved on the right side of the altar. Centuries ago, a series of small aqueducts brought water (considered miraculous) from nearby springs into a small designated area where baptisms were celebrated, but a series of relatively recent earthquakes rendered these channels useless.

When the Crusaders took Antioch during the First Crusade in 1098, a facade was added to the cave, which was rebuilt eight centuries later, in 1863, by Capuchin friars, by order of Pope Pius IX. Today, the cave is only used as a museum, but, with permission, some religious ceremonies are held, especially on Feb. 21, the day on which Antioch celebrates the feast of their patron, Saint Peter.

Our wish is that it may always be an open door when all the other doors close, building in this way, different feelings and acts of Mercy (Gospel according to Luke, chapter 6 and Matthew chapter 25).
