TODAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS



(Jeremiah 23: 1-6; Psalm 22(23); Eph 2: 13-18; Mark 6: 30-34)

Jeremiah was preaching around 600 BC. For forty years before the exile he reminded Judah's rulers how they had broken the covenant, worshipping other gods and taking advantage of the poor. His warnings were ignored, Jerusalem was destroyed, and the people taken into exile in Babylon.

But the Lord promises to rescue his people. He will make a new covenant and send a descendant of David to rule with truth, integrity and honesty.

The psalm celebrates God's loving care for his people, like a shepherd guarding and guiding his flock, and looking forward to his generous end-time feast.

Paul tells the Ephesians that Gentiles and Jews, previously separated by the Law, have now become one "by the blood of Christ". The Law's barriers have been broken down, and God's covenant now extends to Gentiles. Early proposals for Christians to ignore the Jewish Scriptures were rejected, and the Old Testament readings now included at Mass can help our faith.

Mark's Gospel has described the death of John the Baptist while the apostles were away on their mission. On their return Jesus takes them away 'on retreat'. But the crowds follow, setting the scene for the feeding miracles. For the next five weeks we switch to John's Gospel for a fuller account of Eucharistic feeding.

FROM FATHER GAMEIRO'S DESK - God, atheists and believers in court

God does not exist, atheists say, in faith. We cannot know whether God exists, say the agnostics, with ignorance. In many ways God speaks and more through His Son Jesus Christ, believe the believers, with Christian faith. Atheists, agnostics and believers do not make God exist, nor do they make it nonexistent. Everyone speaks of God because He created them. All ask questions: who are we? Why do we see the universe? We see this and that and everyone asks: who did? One sees both good and so much evil, so much injustice and suffering. Who are the culprits? How will it end? So much beauty and pieces of happiness are inebriating, but at last one dies. And then? Atheists and indifferent ask many questions about God, give many answers to answer the questions they ask. They ask even more questions and give more answers, but sometimes they refuse God's answers because they say, in faith, that He does not exist. And if He does, He is the author of evil; is a false god. So, it is like this, in few words. Some atheists say: God is guilty of the evils and injustices of the world, of human suffering; but God



does not exist, they say. Believers say: God is to blame for the evils of humans, because God exists and created free men capable of doing good and evil. The atheists arm their court and condemn God, that does not exist, to be punished of evil and punished to a no existence. Believers are always defending God who does not need to be defended for He is good, caring for his children even when the worst evils and sufferings occur, only because they are free. But they believe that God has to do with evil and good. And God, what does He say? God says, "I am," I exist and I accept being culprit for having created free men "like" Me; and so I am at the origin of the sins of all men who do them because I have created them with freedom and not robots. Even today I would make them free to be good, but I would accept the punishment of atheistic tribunals for so many evils that men do using their freedom. I agree to be punished instead of men. And I acknowledge, in a divine and human court, that my work is good but imperfect, it allows ills and sufferings, many of human initiative. But I want my children free. So now, it's like this. To remedy and rescue the humans that abuse of freedom, I accept the judgment and give my only Son, of my own nature and human nature, to die and suffer the punishment that the atheists apply to Me and continue to say that I do not exist; I accept the punishment that good and sinful atheists and believers deserve for misusing freedom. My last word is the death of my Son on His Cross, and the merciful pardon which He asks for all atheists, agnostics and faithful, and gives to those who recognize that they need it (cf. Joseph R. Aylón, "10 Atheists who changed buses", 2010). Now, my Son, my last Word, will continue to speak, but I remain silent until the judgment that I will make, at the end of time, at the beginning of the new heavens and new earth, which will be presided over by my Son surrounded by his apostles, who have been condemned with him at the first judgment in the presence of Pilate.


The Bend in the THE ROAD

In a short period of time we created partnerships with supermarket chains and restaurants; we have paid dozens of medical prescriptions, we have spent gallons and gallons of petrol riding across the island giving lifts, we have prevented families from going hungry, getting their electricity cut off, running out of gas, losing their homes. We have tried to keep them warm, keep them hopeful, and keep them dreaming...

The Mission Statement of People Helping People is... through social solidarity, to mobilize many people to help many people in a combat against poverty, hunger, illness, exclusion, indifference, intolerance, and social injustice, with a special preference for the last, the least and the lost, having as a model the person of Jesus, the «Good Shepherd» (Gospel according to Luke, chapter 15).
