In a short period of time we created partnerships with supermarket chains and restaurants; we have paid dozens of medical prescriptions, we have spent gallons and gallons of petrol riding across the island giving lifts, we have prevented families from going hungry, getting their electricity cut off, running out of gas, losing their homes. We have tried to keep them warm, keep them hopeful, and keep them dreaming...

The Mission Statement of People Helping People is... through social solidarity, to mobilize many people to help many people in a combat against poverty, hunger, illness, exclusion, indifference, intolerance, and social injustice, with a special preference for the last, the least and the lost, having as a model the person of Jesus, the «Good Shepherd» (Gospel according to Luke, chapter 15). Our wish is that it may always be an open door when all the other doors close, building in this way, different feelings and acts of Mercy (Gospel according to Luke, chapter 6 and Matthew chapter 25).

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

TODAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS

(Numbers 11: 25-29; Psalm 18(19); James 5:1-6; Mark 9: 38-48)

The Book of **Numbers** mainly describes Israel's wanderings in the wilderness from Mount Sinai towards the Promised Land. The people frequently murmured complaints against Moses, who found the burden of leadership too much to bear. Bored with the daily diet of manna, the people complain, so God gives them heaps of quail, but then punishes them for their greed. God gives some of his spirit to seventy elders to share Moses' burden, but even if the whole people became prophets Moses must continue alone as leader.

The Psalm rejoices in the way both the heavens and God's commandments reveal the glory of the Lord, while reminding us that we need cleansing from even our "hidden faults".

Our last reading from the letter of **James** reminds those who are well off that life is short and their sins will be punished. We should patiently share the earth's fruits until the Lord's coming.

In **Mark's Gospel** we hear Jesus' last teachings before he starts his final journey to Jerusalem. Like Moses, Jesus confirms that people may work in God's name even if they have not been formally appointed. God's work is not limited to formal organisations. Above all, we should keep our mind on God's kingdom, not be tempted away from it by the pleasures of this world.

<u>PSALM RESPONSE</u>: The precepts of the Lord gladden the heart.

THE POPE'S MESSAGE FOR THE 107TH WORLD DAY OF **MIGRANTS AND REFUGEES - 2021**


Today the Church celebrates the Day of the Migrants and Refugees. When we see what's happening in refugee camps, people drowning with their families, the tragedy of Afghanistan with parents begging soldiers to take their children with them and then see the Pope so concerned with that tragedy and then see the

indifference of the rest of the church we feel like crying. I want to share with you today some of the Pope's message in the newsletter. Because we don't have much space, I will share only a few paragraphs....

Pope Francis' message:

Dear Brothers and Sisters.

In the Encyclical Fratelli Tutti, I expressed a concern and a hope that remain uppermost in my thoughts: "Once this health crisis passes, our worst response would be to plunge even more deeply into feverish consumerism and new forms of egotistic self-preservation. God willing, after all this, we will think no longer in



....The present time, however, shows that this "we" willed by God is broken and fragmented, wounded and disfigured. This becomes all the more evident in moments of great crisis, as is the case with the current pandemic. Our "we", both in the wider world and within the Church, is crumbling and cracking due

to myopic and aggressive forms of nationalism (cf. Fratelli Tutti, 11) and radical individualism (cf. ibid., 105). And the highest price is being paid by those who most easily become viewed as others: foreigners, migrants, the marginalized, those living on the existential peripheries.... The truth however is that we are all in the same boat and called to work together so that there will be no more walls that separate us, no longer others, but only a single "we", encompassing all of humanity.

An ever more inclusive world

I invite all men and women in our world to make good use of the gifts that the Lord has entrusted to us to preserve and make his creation even more beautiful.....In order to ensure the proper care of our common home, we must become a "we" that is ever wider and more co-responsible, in the profound conviction that whatever good is done in our world is done for present and future generations. Ours must be a personal and collective commitment that cares for all our brothers and sisters who continue to suffer, even as we work towards a more sustainable, balanced and inclusive development. A commitment that makes no distinction between natives and foreigners, between residents and quests, since it is a matter of a treasure we hold in common. from whose care and benefits no one should be excluded.

TINY BOOK FROM THE MIDDLE AGES - with 3 psalms written in gold

In the Middle Ages psalters, or books containing the Psalms, were commonly used by priests and religious for praying the Liturgy of the Hours.

This tiny book pictured here, dates back to the 9th century, and according to an inscription added in the 15th century, once belonged to St. Rupert, the founder of the monastery of St. Peter in Salzburg,

where it is preserved.

Often richly illustrated, the medieval psalter served a similar purpose to today's popular Magnificat magazine, a handy illustrated spiritual guide, often small enough to be carried in a pocket.

The psalter of Bishop Rupert shows off medieval monks' astounding talent of miniaturization. Measuring only 3.7 cm by 3.1 cm, the tiny manuscript contains Psalms 1, 51, and 101, written in gold on parchment. The psalter contains a full-page miniature portraying King David with his psaltery, a stringed instrument that traditionally accompanied the Psalms. The portrait follows the Late Antique tradition of adding the image of the author to the text, thus testifying the authenticity of the Psalms.
