A very small group of people attending the English Mass decided to do just that after the floods in 2010! In a short period of time we created partnerships with supermarket chains and restaurants; we have paid dozens of medical prescriptions, we have spent gallons and gallons of petrol riding across the island giving lifts, we have prevented families from going hungry, getting their electricity cut off, running out of gas, losing their homes. We have tried to keep them warm, keep them hopeful, and keep them dreaming ...

The Mission Statement of People Helping People is... through social solidarity, to mobilize many people to help many people in a combat against poverty, hunger, illness, exclusion, indifference, intolerance, and social injustice, with a special preference for the last, the least and the lost, having as a model the person of Jesus, the «Good Shepherd» (Gospel according to Luke, chapter 15). Our wish is that it may always be an open door when all the other doors close, building in this way, different feelings and acts of Mercy (Gospel according to Luke, chapter 6 and Matthew chapter 25).

CATHOLIC MASS IN ENGLISH MADEIRA:

Good morning! Welcome to the Chapel of Our Lady of Penha de França. Today is the 1st Sunday of Advent, and the start of a new Liturgical year (Year C).

This English Mass is a tradition that dates back to 1966, when Fr Rafael Andrade, having just returned from his first visit to England, complied with the Bishop's request to start an English celebration. Father Rafael presided over this mass for over 30 years, when he had to stop in 1999 due to overlapping duties. For eight years there was no Catholic mass in English in Madeira, until it began again on the first Sunday of Lent in 2007. Father Bernardino Andrade is now our appointed Sunday priest. He was born and brought up in Madeira but has worked as a Priest in both Moçambique and, for many years, in California.



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TODAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS

(Jeremiah 33:14-16; Ps 24(25); 1 Thess 3:12 - 4:2; Luke 21:25-28, 34-36)

A few weeks ago we heard Jeremiah promising the deliverance of his people. This week he describes how this hope will be realised, even though Jerusalem and the

Temple had been destroyed. A descendant of David will bring honesty, integrity and security to Israel. Jeremiah's complex writings changed Jewish expectations from a single Day of Judgement to a gradual process: an initial time of suffering, then an in-between period. This was identified by early Christians as now, after Christ's death had inaugurated the New Covenant, while we await the promised completion in Christ's second coming. These rather mild verses from the Psalm fail to show its directness: "In your kindness, recall me - You". The earliest New Testament writing, Paul wrote this first letter to the Thessalonians from Corinth, probably in 51 AD, where Timothy had brought news of the Thessalonian church's progress. Paul prays that the Lord should increase their love for one another, exhorting them to show this love by leading moral lives. We are starting the year of Luke, but the gospel for the beginning of Advent is from the end of Jesus' ministry, where he warns us to be ready for the end times. Every one of us faces an end time, and we must live our lives as if it comes today.

PSALM RESPONSE: To you, O Lord, I lift up my soul.

A PREGNANT WOMAN DOESN'T "WAIT" FOR A BABY

One of the most fascinating things in the world of communication between languages is the "game" of words. For example: In English, people "play" football and "play" piano. In Spanish and Portuguese people "play" football and "touch" piano. It would sound cute and funny if people translated literally and said "play" piano instead of "touch" piano.

The opposite happens with the word "wait" and "expect".

- In Portuguese and Spanish, people "wait" for a bus and a pregnant woman "waits" for a baby.
- In English, people "wait" for a bus but a pregnant woman "expects" a baby.
- This difference is powerful and for me it is one of the greatest symbols of Advent.

.... What's the difference between "<u>waiting</u>" and "<u>expecting</u>"? I think that the biggest difference lays on what people do in between.

.... When people wait, they do whatever they want just to "kill time".

.... When a pregnant woman "expects" a baby she never "kills time". She is always active even when she is sleeping. Her body, her thoughts, her emotions are constantly being transformed. She will never be the same woman again.

....What a powerful image for Advent.

....**Christians are not just "waiting"** for Christmas or "waiting" for the Saviour to come to their lives. **Christians are "expecting".** And like a pregnant woman they live in anticipation, their lives are being transformed. They live a sense of <u>urgency.</u> They know that their lives, their marriages, their families and their communities will never be the same again.



....No woman stays the same after she has been touched by the <u>power</u> of a <u>fragile</u> baby.

.... No person stays the same after being touched by the <u>power</u> of a powerful God who became a fragile baby.

.... During this Advent it's up to me and to you to choose to just "wait" for Christmas, spend money and "kill time"....or "expect" Christmas and live a sense of urgency and transformation through prayer and through the Sacraments and service to the poor.

Happy Advent... Happy journey for Christmas!

NEW MASS REGULATIONS – Introduced by the Madeiran Regional Government

As informed last week, the Madeiran Regional Government announced new measures after noticing a sudden increase of covid cases on the island. The regulations also include measures for Mass attendance in churches, and affect everyone on the island, visitors included.

Those attending Mass must have either:

- a valid Covid-19 Vaccination Certificate OR
- a negative Covid-19 Antigen Test dated within the preceding 7 days.

The usual measures which have been in place up to now will continue: (masks to be worn at all times inside <u>and outside</u> the Chapel, maintaining of social distance, disinfecting of hands, etc.)
