A very small group of people attending the English Mass decided to do just that after the floods in 2010! In a short period of time we created partnerships with supermarket chains and restaurants; we have paid dozens of medical prescriptions, we have spent gallons and gallons of petrol riding across the island giving lifts, we have prevented families from going hungry, getting their electricity cut off, running out of gas, losing their homes. We have tried to keep them warm, keep them hopeful, and keep them dreaming...

The Mission Statement of People Helping People is... through social solidarity, to mobilize many people to help many people in a combat against poverty, hunger, illness, exclusion, indifference, intolerance, and social injustice, with a special preference for the last, the least and the lost, having as a model the person of Jesus, the «Good Shepherd» (Gospel according to Luke, chapter 15). Our wish is that it may always be an open door when all the other doors close, building in this way, different feelings and acts of Mercy (Gospel according to Luke, chapter 6 and Matthew chapter 25).

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THE CATHOLIC MASS IN ENGLISH IN MADEIRA

Good morning! Welcome! Father Bernardino Andrade is our appointed Sunday priest. He was born in Madeira but lived and preached for many years in America, and also in Mozambique.

TODAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS

(Isaiah 43: 16-21; Psalm 125(126); Phil 3: 8-14; John 8: 1-11)

Second Isaiah describes the new Exodus, the return from exile in Babylon. God shows who he is by his preparations and care for their return. These are so wonderful that his servant Israel, his chosen witnesses, will no longer need to remember their Exodus from Egypt. Exodus is a repeatable pattern. The Lord even forgives Israel's many sins, which led to their exile, and will continue to do so, because "I have redeemed you; I have called you by name: you are mine". The Psalm celebrates the Israelites' joy after their return from exile in Babylon. Writing from prison, Paul shares his hopes, fears and convictions with the Philippians. The great gift of knowing Jesus Christ as Lord makes his previous righteousness under the Law seem worthless. He is possessed by Christ but not yet arrived, keeping his eye on the final goal of living in God's new world.

The story of the woman caught in adultery is found in different places in various manuscripts: it fits better with Luke's gospel, but here in **John's gospel** it matches the changing mood. This chapter opens with a woman about to be stoned, then freed from death. But it ends with people seeking to stone Jesus. Jesus has shown them God's wisdom, different from men's.

PSALM RESPONSE: What marvels the Lord worked for us! Indeed we were glad.

A DESERT IN A HOTEL - «DON'T BEHAVE LIKE A CHILD»

Lent is a time to walk through the desert. From slavery to freedom. From death to life. From sin to grace.

A desert can be experienced anywhere. Carlo Carretto wrote a fantastic book called "The desert in the City".

To help them to cross the desert, a group of priests of the Diocese of Funchal

made their retreat in one of the hotels of the Island. This was one of the three turns (to take part in a retreat) that are offered to priests every year, in different places. This way it is easier for each priest to choose the most convenient time for him. A priest, a University Professor in Lisbon, was our retreat director. It was absolutely fascinating the theme that he chose for our days of prayer and reflection. The retreat and all the conferences were around the theme of how children are the model of the disciples.

The children are the Sacrament of the Kingdom of God:

«People were bringing little children to Him in order that they may touch them, and the disciples spoke sternly to them. But when Jesus saw this he was indignant and said to them: Let the little children come to me; do not stop them, for it is for such as these that the Kingdom of God belongs. Truly I tell you: whoever does not receive the Kingdom of God as a little child will never enter it. And He took them up in his arms, laid his hands on them, and blessed them». (Mk. 10: 13 – 16).



There is no doubt that we live our religion very far away from the project of Jesus.

In our society, especially inside our churches, the children are seen as a disturbance and as a burden. How many times we hear people saying: "Don't behave like a child". Jesus says the opposite: "Behave like a child". We Catholics are against abortion... but the majority of Catholics, including priests, don't like to see children in Church. If they make any little noise people look at their mothers as if they were criminals.

During our retreat, the priest director explained some of the main qualities of a child.

The first of them is *vulnerability*. A child is very fragile, very vulnerable. We must accept and embrace our vulnerability. St. Paul says: *«To keep me from being too elated, a thorn was given me in my flesh, a messenger of Satan to torment me, to keep me from being too elated. Three times I appealed to the Lord*

about this, that it would leave me, but he said to me «My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness. So I will boast all the more gladly of my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may dwell in me». Therefore I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions and calamities for the sake of Christ; for whenever I am week, then I am strong». (II Cor. 12: 7-10).

Maybe it was inspired by this ministry of the children's vulnerability that Henry Nouwen wrote a wonderful book with the title of the «The Wounded Healer».

WHY PRIESTS GO ON RETREATS

Many Catholics are not aware that Priests go on a spiritual retreat once a year. Why do they do this? Priests, religious and even seminarians are required by Canon Law to go on a yearly retreat:

"[Religious] are faithfully to observe the period of annual retreat" (Can. 663 §5).

"[Priests] are equally bound to make time for spiritual retreats according to the prescripts of particular law" (Can. 276 §2).

"Each year [seminarians] are to make a **spiritual** retreat" (Can. 246 §5).

What happens during a Retreat? A spiritual director is invited to lead the priests on retreat, which normally lasts 5 days. A theme is chosen for reflection, and there is also time for prayer, and for confession. The retreat is a time where priests are able to make time for themselves, and afterwards to go back to their churches, feeling recharged.



These two photos on the right, above, were taken at this year's first priest retreat which was held from 7-11th of March. The retreat was guided by Fr. Alexandre Palma, from the Patriarchate of Lisbon. 14 priests from our Diocese participated.
