In a short period of time we created partnerships with supermarket chains and restaurants; we have paid dozens of medical prescriptions, we have spent gallons and gallons of petrol riding across the island giving lifts, we have prevented families from going hungry, getting their electricity cut off, running out of gas, losing their homes. We have tried to keep them warm, keep them hopeful, and keep them dreaming...

The Mission Statement of People Helping People is... through social solidarity, to mobilize many people to help many people in a combat against poverty, hunger, illness, exclusion, indifference, intolerance, and social injustice, with a special preference for the last, the least and the lost, having as a model the person of Jesus, the «Good Shepherd» (Gospel according to Luke, chapter 15). Our wish is that it may always be an open door when all the other doors close, building in this way. different feelings and acts of Mercy (Gospel according to Luke, chapter 6 and Matthew chapter 25).

TODAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS – 25th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year A

(Isaiah 55:6-9; Psalm 144(145):2-3. 8-9. 17-18 r.18; Philippians 1:20-24, 27; Matthew 20:1-16a)

Earlier in this chapter Isaiah invited us to the joyful banquet the Lord has prepared for us - "the supper of the Lamb". Today's reading urges us to "seek the Lord while he may be found": hidden and unimaginably different from us, yet he is near and wanting to give us his forgiveness. The Psalm, a hymn of praise to God's mercy, recalls when the Israelites worshipped the golden calf: the Lord is "slow to anger and abounding in mercy". For the next four weeks the second reading is from Paul's letter to the Philippians, probably written about 57 AD from Ephesus. Paul writes to thank the Philippians for the money they had sent him while he was in prison, and to encourage them to support each other in their pagan surroundings. Paul is very clear about his future life with Christ immediately after death. Sharing in Christ's suffering means also sharing in the joy of the union with Christ which such suffering brings. Paul is torn between wishing to be gone and so be with Christ, or staying alive suffering in the Lord's work. In Matthew's gospel even those rejected by others are swept up into the Lord's vineyard. Justice to those hired first is balanced by mercy to the latecomers.

PSALM RESPONSE: The Lord is close to all who call him.

This week we will reprint a column that Fr. Bernardino wrote in an older issue of our newsletter: (no 184, on the 22nd of September 2019)

A SCIENTIST WHO BECAME A STARFISH SAVER

He was a scientist and was writing a book. Every afternoon he would go to the beach, not to swim, but to take advantage of the sound of the waves, the scenery... of the many kilometers of yellow sand, the presence of children splashing in the water and the gentle flying of elegant seagulls.

There was a small distance between the water and a small forest where there were trees that would protect the scientist from the sun. He would bring a small folding chair and for a while that space was his small office. None of these apparent distractions were able to distract him from his job that, for him, was also a hobby.

None of these activities were able to distract him, except for one. Every afternoon he could see a man «dancing» by himself on the sand. This man would bend down, would stand up, would open his arms and would repeat almost the same movements for a long time. This «show» was happening every afternoon. It was something that started distracting him and then started intriguing him. He even thought if it could be a kind of religious ritual of some kind of religion.

Finally, the scientist decided to unveil the mystery. He left his papers on his chair and full of curiosity approached the «dancing man» and asked for the meaning of that ritual.

The «dancing man» stopped for a while and gladly explained to his visitor:



«It is because in this water there are many starfish. When the tides rise up, the starfish are thrown onto the sand of the beach. The problem is that when the tides go down most of them stay on the dry sand and die. I come every afternoon looking for starfish that have stayed on the sand, and to save them, I pick them up one by one, and throw them back in the water. I know that those starfish are safe and alive».

The scientist, expressing some kind of disbelief told him: «But, my friend, there are hundreds of kilometers of sand on this beach, what difference does that make?».

The «dancing man» bent down, picked up another starfish that was close to his feet and said: «Does it make any difference to **this one?**»

The following afternoon the scientist stopped writing his book in the afternoons and joined the «dancing man»... saving starfish.





A TAILOR CALLED JAN TYRANOWSKI - Pope St. John Paul II's mentor

Did you know that a tailor called Jan Tyranowski was the central figure in the spiritual formation of Karol Józef Wojtyła, who became Pope John Paul II?

Jan Tyranowski was born on 9 February 1901 in Kraków, Poland. His father had plans for him and directed him to the accounting profession, which he studied for. He obtained his high school diploma to enter accounting but this was cut short in 1930 when he suffered from a chronic and debilitating

stomach ailment that forced him to quit. He began to work in his father's tailor shop and inherited it after his death.

As priests were carted off by the Gestapo during the occupation of Poland in World War II, Jan reluctantly stepped into unknown territory. He was asked by a Salesian priest to form and advise a group of young men, and to create a youth ministry team for the parish. He was a shy man and did not deal much with people. He was not at all attracted to the youth - the idea of speaking to them terrified him. When Jan protested, he was told, "Do not be afraid, the Lord will help you." The Lord blessed his efforts, and Jan was able to clandestinely bring together team leaders and implement the "Living Rosary" groups that served as a lifeline for the young people suffering under the Nazi occupation. Those involved had many close calls. Youth groups of any kind, especially those that promoted a Polish identity, of which Catholicism was central, were targeted by the Gestapo. Tyranowski's apartment was once raided during a Living Rosary gathering. We do not know what this soft-spoken man said to the Germans, but they left.

Jan continued to mentor his team of *Living Rosary* group leaders, adjusting his approach to suit each one personally. **Karol Wojtyla, who would later become Pope John Paul II, was one of the team and a** *Living Rosary* **group leader. At this time, Karol was in his early twenties with not one living family member, and Jan Tyranowski helped fill the painful void. He was not only a mentor to young Karol but also a spiritual director, friend, and father figure. Jan Tyranowski managed to attend Karol's ordination as a priest on 1 November 1946 just a few months before his death on the 15th of March 1947.**
