In a short period of time we created partnerships with supermarket chains and restaurants; we have paid dozens of medical prescriptions, we have spent gallons and gallons of petrol riding across the island giving lifts, we have prevented families from going hungry, getting their electricity cut off, running out of gas, losing their homes. We have tried to keep them warm, keep them hopeful, and keep them dreaming...

The Mission Statement of People Helping People is... through social solidarity, to mobilize many people to help many people in a combat against poverty, hunger, illness, exclusion, indifference, intolerance, and social injustice, with a special preference for the last, the least and the lost, having as a model the person of Jesus, the «Good Shepherd» (Gospel according to Luke, chapter 15). Our wish is that it may always be an open door when all the other doors close, building in this way, different feelings and acts of Mercy (Gospel according to Luke, chapter 6 and Matthew chapter 25).

CATHOLIC MASS - 10 AM (IN ENGLISH)

Good morning! Today is the 13th Sunday in Ordinary Time. We are blessed by the presence of two dedicated priests who celebrate Mass here at the Chapel in English for us on Sundays: Father Joseph Arun, and Father Thomas Muzhuthett, both originally from Kerala, India.

TODAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS – 13th Sunday in Ordinary Time - Year B (*Wisdom 1: 13-15, 2:23-24; Psalm 29(30); 2 Corinthians 89: 7-15; Mark: 5: 21-43*)

The Book of Wisdom, written in the century before Christ, starts by exhorting us to "love righteousness ... and seek the Lord with sincerity of heart". God made man in his own image: not immortal, for only God is immortal, but God made man "imperishable". Death is not the end.

The Psalm gives thanks for deliverance from death: prayers during sickness were answered by God, triumphing over death.

The reading from Paul's second letter to the **Corinthians** might have been written today: we should share the earth's resources with other peoples currently in need. We may need help some time! Paul was collecting financial aid for the Church in Jerusalem, since many towns in the rest of the empire had greater resources. Paul's approach is supremely practical: he praises the Corinthians and then challenges them to give generously. But they should always keep a balance, not beggar themselves. We resume our Sunday readings from **Mark's gospel**. During his journey to heal Jairus' daughter, Jesus is interrupted by a woman seeking a cure for her continuous haemorrhage. Jesus tells her her faith has restored her to health. As with the child raised from the dead, God's kingdom breaks through, to help us understand what God has planned for us in his new creation.

PSALM RESPONSE: I will praise you, Lord, you have rescued me.

THE LORD OF THE WAVES

POPULAR SAINTS FESTIVAL (Festa dos Santos Populares): 12-29th June

The Popular Saints Festival (*Festa dos Santos Populares* – in Portuguese) has been taking place all over the island in the month of June, and is strongly rooted in the traditions of Madeira. They are the high social point of many regions on the island. **These festivities are dedicated to the 3 popular saints: St. Anthony** (*Santo António*), St. John (*São João*) and St. Peter (*São Pedro*).



The celebrations begin with Saint Anthony, traditionally the saint of love, and a match-maker, but St. John is the most



popular saint. From 19th - 24th June, **local shops** prepare and show off their creativity by decorating small altars in honour of the 3 saints. There are also lively musical performances in the city centre.

The festivities conclude during the weekend of the 27th June to 1st July in the town of *Camara de Lobos*, 28th-29th June in the town of *Santa Cruz*, and this weekend of 28th-30th June in the town of *Ribeira Brava*, where the final parades for St. Peter (*São Pedro*) are held.

Like many Madeiran religious festivals, this weekend embraces worship, food, family and entertainment.
