António once said, "One must find new ways of helping the poor". A very small group of people attending the English Mass decided to do just that after the floods in 2010! In a short period of time we created partnerships with supermarket chains and restaurants; we have paid dozens of medical prescriptions, we have spent gallons and gallons of petrol riding across the island giving lifts, we have prevented families from going hungry, getting their electricity cut off, running out of gas, losing their homes. We have tried to keep them warm, keep them hopeful, and keep them dreaming...


TODAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS - Baptism of the Lord - Year C

(Isaiah 40:1-5, 9-11; Psalm 103(104); Titus 2:11-14; 3:4-7; Luke 3: 15-16, 21-22)

Writing in Babylon about 540 BC, second Isaiah majestically consoles Israel in its exile. God tenderly commands his attendants to comfort Israel and to prepare a sacred way for them to return to Jerusalem. He will lead his people to freedom across the desert in a new Exodus. The coming of God's rule should be announced to the whole world, shouted from the mountain-tops. The Psalm magnificently praises and celebrates God's creative wisdom and power. Titus worked with Paul and later administered the church in Crete. In this pastoral letter Paul advises Titus on setting up church structures and choosing suitable presbyters for each local church. All Christians, and especially Church leaders, are urged to lead godly lives. We should reveal God's love to others in our good behaviour, while not disrupting the lives of others, in confident expectation of our redemption. Luke saw us as living in a time of waiting, one of three phases he saw in salvation history. Luke's time of promise, the period of Israel, ended when John was put in prison by Herod, after John the Baptist's prediction that Jesus would baptise with the Holy Spirit. Jesus' baptism begins the period when this promise is fulfilled. Luke's Book of Acts describes his third phase, the beginning of the church. - Brought to you by: Chris Oliver. 

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Water is deeply woven into the fabric of Madeira's identity. From the cascading waterfalls like Véu da Noiva and Cascata dos Anios to the intricate network of levadas that carry life-giving water through our verdant landscapes, it surrounds us and sustains us. Even the ravines that flow from the mountain peaks to the ocean remind us of the island's intimate relationship with water.

As an island, Madeira is shaped by water in many ways, yet one aspect of its past is no longer as visible women washing clothes in the streams. I still remember, as a child, watching the women gather at the Ribeira de São João, scrubbing and bleaching white sheets in the sun, their work transforming soiled fabrics into clean and bright linens. It was a vivid image of renewal and purity.

This memory resonates with my experience in the Holy Land, visiting the River Jordan, where pilgrims flock to the site of Jesus' baptism. John the Baptist's call still echoes, inviting people to repentance and renewal. However, as I stood there, I reflected that if we simply visit this sacred place or even undergo baptism but remain unchanged, we miss the deeper call.

Baptism is far more than an event; it is a transformation, a regeneration into new life in Christ. It is the beginning of our Christian journey, not its culmination. As the Catechism of the Catholic Church reminds us, "Through Baptism we are freed from sin and reborn as children of God" (CCC 1213). This sacrament cleanses us, just as water cleanses physically, but it also calls us to continual renewal.

The Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, which we celebrate at this time, invites us to reflect on our own baptism. In being baptised, Jesus sanctified the waters of the Jordan, transforming them




into a source of spiritual renewal for all. Though sinless, He entered the waters to take on our humanity and show us the way to salvation. His baptism marked the beginning of His public ministry, a mission to reconcile humanity to God.

For us, baptism is the beginning of our mission too. It calls us not only to live as children of God but to share that gift with others. Just as Madeira's waters flow from the mountains to the sea, bringing life wherever they go, we are called to carry the grace of baptism into the world, making straight the paths for others to encounter Christ.

May we heed John the Baptist's cry to repentance and open our hearts to Christ's transforming power, allowing Him to wash us clean anew. And as we journey together as a parish, let us help one another walk in the light of our baptismal promises, becoming instruments of His love and grace in the world.
