We have tried to keep them warm, keep them hopeful, and keep them dreaming...



TODAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS – 2nd Sunday in Ordinary Time – Year C (Isaiah 62: 1-5; Psalm 95(96): 1-3.7-10; 1 Corinthians 12: 4-11; John 2: 1-11)

Writing after 515 BC, when the Temple had been rebuilt after the exile, third Isaiah heavily criticised idolatry and other excesses in the Temple, and injustices among the people. But he also had this glorious vision of a restored Jerusalem, comparing the Lord's delight in his people with the bridegroom's delight in his virgin bride. The Psalm invites all mankind and all creation to praise the Lord, the one true God. Over these Sundays before Lent we hear from Paul's letter to his beloved church in Corinth. Paul criticised the Corinthian Christians for misbehaving during the Eucharist: the rich ate and drank too well, while poorer members of the community were left out. The church should have unity in diversity: different gifts are given to different individuals, so that all contribute to the whole. After the Baptism of Jesus, and before resuming our readings from Luke's gospel, we hear today John's description of a marriage feast at Cana. A happy family occasion, to which Jesus and his newly chosen disciples were invited. Both Isaiah and Paul saw that the Lord longs to join himself to his church as intimately as possible. Water intended for use in Jewish purification rites is replaced by the fine wine of the heavenly banquet.

story of this orange, the only Christmas gift of my childhood. A few days later I got a bag of oranges from a family. Since then, I always found a yellow orange on the top of the altar on the First Sunday of Advent and a box of

oranges was delivered to my Parish residence on Christmas Eve. When I left California, 12 years ago, the same family gave me a plastic orange that I still treasure in my room. It is still yellow and beautiful and full of memories. – (June 2019)

Since its introduction in 1965, *Nutella* (a chocolate spread) became an instant sensation enjoyed today by millions around the world. It might surprise you to learn that founder and inventor, Michele Ferrero, credits all of his success to Our Lady of Lourdes.



Michele Ferrero, the late founder of the world famous *Ferrero* confectionery company and inventor of *Nutella*, was a humble man who

preferred to stay out of the spotlight. Few people know that he was a fiercely devout Catholic endowed with a strong faith. **Michele Ferrero had a particularly strong devotion to Our Lady of Lourdes.** He ensured every one of the company's offices and factories in Italy and abroad had at least one statue of the Madonna.

Every year, he would visit the shrine of Our Lady at Lourdes, and would organize pilgrimages for his employees to visit as well. In fact, not only is the popular *Ferrero Rocher* praline named after the shrine, but even its design was inspired by it as well. The craggy

grotto at the shine to Our Lady of Lourdes is called the *Rocher de Massabielle*, whose appearance inspired the design and name of the popular praline treat. It isn't hard to imagine the rough nutty surface with a hollow interior, resembling that of the sacred grotto of Lourdes. In 1996 when he celebrated the 50th anniversary of the

founding of Ferrero, he revealed the sole reason for his success:

"Everything that I have accomplished I owe to Our Lady of Lourdes, to Mary. I have always placed myself in her hands and I thank her. I pray to her every morning and this gives me strength. Without her

The Gospel for this Sunday brings us to the Wedding at Cana (John 2:1-11), where Jesus performs His first public miracle. With a quiet act of compassion, He transforms water into wine, revealing His glory for the first time. What's remarkable

about this moment is not just the miracle itself but where it happens – at an ordinary wedding celebration, among family, friends,

and neighbours. In this act, **Jesus shows us that God is not distant from the ordinary.** Instead, He works in and through it, transforming the mundane into something extraordinary.





31/12/2023 – Fr. Bernardino's final Mass at the Chapel



This Gospel reminds me of a moment with Fr. Bernardino that deeply moved me and those who witnessed it. Back in 2023, I had the privilege of being with the community at Penha de França Chapel while Fr. Bernardino was unwell. From October 2023 to January 2024 I served there, a time that culminated in Fr. Bernardino celebrating his final Mass at Penha alongside Fr. Thomas, with me as the assisting deacon. During that November, my wife Andrea and I celebrated our 40th wedding anniversary. Although we had hoped for his blessing, his ill health meant he was absent from the chapel for much of that period. Still, his presence and spirit were felt throughout those weeks.

One late December evening, at a packed Moynihan's Irish Bar, I unexpectedly saw Fr. Bernardino enjoying supper. Despite his frailty, he looked content. We hugged, exchanged words of gratitude, and shared a brief, joyful moment. He even congratulated us on our 40th wedding anniversary. Then, as he was returning to his table, he came back to me and made an extraordinary request.



"You know," he said, "in all my years as a priest, **I've given thousands of blessings**, but no one blesses me. I would love you to give me a blessing."

I was stunned by his humility. Here was a holy priest, who had spent his life pouring out blessings on others, now asking a deacon for a blessing. "Of course," I said, thinking he meant at Mass on Sunday. But he smiled and said, "Shall we do it now?"

The pub was buzzing with life - people laughing, getting ready for the quiz night - but I stood up, placed my hands on his head, and prayed, giving him a blessing. Suddenly, the noise of the terrace softened. Nearby tables grew silent, and heads bowed in respect. My family, moved to tears, witnessed something beautiful: the ordinary transformed into the sacred.

That moment was a reflection of the Gospel at Cana. Just as Jesus revealed God's glory by turning water into wine, **Fr. Bernardino revealed the presence of God in the most unexpected place - a crowded Irish pub in the middle of Funchal.** His humility, faith, and openness to receiving grace touched everyone who witnessed it.

The story of Cana and the moment with Fr. Bernardino remind us that **God's glory is not limited to grand, majestic settings.** It is revealed in the small, everyday moments of life, often in the places we least expect. God's grace is abundant, and when we open our hearts, even ordinary water can become the finest wine.

This Sunday, let us reflect on how we can recognise and reveal God's glory in



our own lives. Like Mary at Cana, we are called to trust in Jesus' power to transform.

Like Father Bernardino, we are reminded of the humility it takes to ask for and receive blessings from others. And like those gathered at Moynihan's that night, we are invited to pause and acknowledge the sacred moments in our everyday lives.

May we have eyes to see and hearts to embrace the presence of God wherever we find ourselves, **trusting** that He is always working to turn the ordinary into something extraordinary.
