In a short period of time, we created partnerships with supermarket chains and restaurants; we have paid dozens of medical prescriptions, we have spent gallons and gallons of petrol riding across the island giving lifts, we have prevented families from going hungry, getting their electricity cut off, running out of gas, losing their homes. We have tried to keep them warm, keep them hopeful, and keep them dreaming.

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THE CATHOLIC MASS IN ENGLISH

Good morning. Welcome to the Chapel of Our Lady of Penha de Franca. This small Chapel was founded in 1622... which makes it 403 years old this year! It is in this chapel that the only English-

language Catholic mass on the island of Madeira is celebrated (every Sunday at 10H00). On Saturday evenings at 18H30 a Mass is celebrated in Portuguese.



TODAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS – 5th Sunday in Ordinary Time (Isaiah 6:1-2a,3-8; Psalm 137(138); 1 Corinthians 15:1-11; Luke 5:1-11)

Isaiah's calling vision in 742 BC is much quoted in the book of Revelation. He sees God enthroned, with Seraphs who had two wings covering their faces, two covering their body, and with two they flew. They praised God for his total otherness, and their "Holy, Holy, Holy" is repeated before the central part of every Mass. Isaiah expects to die after seeing God's face. But he is symbolically purified by a burning ember on his lips, and so is fit to deliver God's message of doom to those who mistreat the poor. Only a remnant will survive. Paul reminds the Corinthians of their roots and especially the gospel he taught them. He uses an existing creedal formula that he himself "had been taught", namely "that Christ died", "he was buried; he was raised; he appeared". Paul goes on to argue that, in rising, Christ has conquered death, and therefore all the dead will also rise. Life after death is bodily, not just spiritual, as the Corinthians appeared to believe. After Jesus was rejected in Nazareth he went down to Capernaum, where he taught and healed many people, including Simon's mother-in-law. Today Luke describes Simon Peter recognising Jesus as "Lord", his title after the Resurrection. Peter and his partners accept Jesus' call, and follow him, leaving absolutely - Brought to you by: Chris Oliver. (www.bible-groups.info) everything.

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REFLECTION FOR THE 5th SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

"In the presence of the angels I praise you, O Lord." (Psalm 138:1) If you walk through the markets of Madeira, you will likely come across the espada, or black scabbard fish. Long, dark and weird looking, it is caught in the deep, cold waters far below the surface. Fishermen from Câmara de Lobos head out before dawn, lowering their lines into depths of over 1,000 metres, trusting that beneath the unseen waters, the catch is waiting. It is hard, sometimes dangerous work - but they go, because they know that the sea provides.

In today's Gospel (Luke 5:1–11), Simon Peter and his companions have spent the night fishing but have caught nothing. They are exhausted, disheartened, and ready to give up. Then Jesus steps into Peter's boat and tells him to "**put out into deep water and lower your nets for a catch.**" It seems pointless - what difference would another attempt make? But Peter listens, obeys, and suddenly the impossible happens: their nets overflow with fish.



Like the espada fishermen who go to depths unseen, Peter is

invited to go beyond what is comfortable, beyond what seems logical, and to **trust in Jesus' word**. And in doing so, he discovers something greater than a miraculous catch - he discovers his **true calling**. Jesus tells him, "Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching people."

This Gospel is a vision of heaven on earth. Just as heaven has its order - God at the centre, the angels serving, and the saints gathered in His presence - so too does this moment by the Sea of Galilee. Jesus stands in the boat, the apostles are called to serve, and the people are waiting to be drawn into the kingdom. Peter's first response is to feel unworthy: "Depart from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man." But Jesus does not look for perfection - He looks for trust. Like the fishermen of Madeira who lower their lines into the deep, unsure of what they will bring up, we are called to trust in Christ's word, even when the outcome is uncertain.

In the **first reading (Isaiah 6:1-8)**, Isaiah has a vision of heaven, where he hears the angels cry, *"Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts!"* This same hymn resounds at every **Mass** as we join the angels in praise. Isaiah, like Peter, feels unworthy, but God purifies him and sends him forth with a mission.



The psalm today reminds us, "In the presence of the angels I praise you, O Lord." Every Mass, every act of love, and every moment of faith is a step towards heaven. Jesus calls each of us to be His disciples, to cast our nets in trust, and to draw others into His kingdom. May we have the courage to go into the deep, knowing that when we follow Christ, He always provides.

At the end of Mass, we, too, are sent forth. After encountering Christ in the Eucharist, we hear the final words: "Go forth, the Mass is ended." Just as Isaiah is sent, just as Peter is called, we are commissioned to bring Christ into the world. Heaven touches earth in the Mass, and we are called to carry that presence into our daily lives.
