António once said, "One must find new ways of helping the poor". A very small group of people attending the English Mass decided to do just that after the floods in 2010! In a short period of time, we created partnerships with supermarket chains and restaurants; we have paid dozens of medical prescriptions, we have spent gallons and gallons of petrol riding across the island giving lifts, we have prevented families from going hungry, getting their electricity cut off, running out of gas, losing their homes. We have tried to keep them warm, keep them hopeful, and keep



THE CATHOLIC MASS IN ENGLISH

Good morning. Welcome to the Chapel of Our Lady of Penha de França. The special intention of this morning's Holy Mass will be for the Dos Santos Family, and in a special way for *Brigita Dos Santos* who is in the hospital, in the ICU.



TODAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS – 1st Sunday of Lent

(Deuteronomy 26:4-10: Psalm 90 (91): Romans 10:8-13: Luke 4:1-13)

Deuteronomy, the "second law", repeats the law given on Sinai. It describes events just before the Israelites crossed the Jordan from the desert into the promised land. In today's reading Moses uses an ancient formula to prescribe how the first fruits of the harvest are to be offered in gratitude for the gifts God has given to a landless people. As with our offerings during Mass, the priest's role is to begin the celebration by setting the offerings "before the Lord your God".

The Psalm describes benefits of trusting in God: protection from evils and terrors as God goes with us in our distress.

Paul has lamented to the Romans that the works and rituals of the Mosaic Law did not bring Israel righteousness, and they cannot justify us, that is make us right with God. Everyone can be saved, but only by confessing faith in God from their heart.

In Luke's gospel we hear how, after his baptism, Jesus was tempted in the desert. The devil's power is real. Perhaps Jesus was often tempted during his ministry to use lavish gifts, force or exhibitions of supernatural power to convince people. But Jesus remained faithful to his Father. The only way to God is by service and suffering. The devil is routed for now, but will return during Jesus' passion.




Many of you are aware that in Madeira, we are sometimes affected by the Sahara Desert, which brings the hot *Leste* weather our way. The winds and dust from this desert are closer to us than mainland Portugal. But there's another desert that is even closer and visible from Funchal: the Desertas Islands.



As we begin the season of Lent, we are invited to reflect and transform, much like the harsh, windswept Desertas Islands. These islands, once thought too barren to sustain life, have now become a sanctuary for rare species. This transformation reminds us that even the toughest environments can become places of new life and renewal. In the same way, Lent invites us to enter our own "desert" spaces, where, despite the challenges, transformation and growth can happen.

The Desertas Islands are a powerful symbol of how life can thrive in unexpected places. Similarly, Lent can be a season of spiritual renewal. Just as life slowly returns to the islands, Lent strips us of distractions, bringing us closer to God. During this time, we can allow ourselves to be renewed, just as the islands are being carefully nurtured to support new life.



This theme is echoed in the story of Jesus' 40 days in the desert. As we approach the 40 days of Lent, we're reminded that Jesus entered the wilderness not to be defeated, but to prepare for His mission. His time in the desert was about facing temptation, finding strength, and drawing closer to His Father. Far from being a place of emptiness, the desert became a space where He was refined and strengthened.

Lent, for us, is much the same. It's a time to enter our own spiritual desert, letting go of distractions and focusing on God. Like the Desertas Islands, which slowly bloom with life through care and attention, our spiritual lives can flourish during Lent if we make the time to nurture them. The desert may seem barren or difficult, but it is exactly where new growth can begin. It's a place where we can learn to depend more fully on God's grace.

Lent may feel like a time of emptiness, but it's also a time of preparation -a time to let go of old habits, be refined, and open ourselves to the new life God wants to bring. Just as the Desertas Islands have been given a second chance, we too can experience spiritual renewal. After the challenges of the desert, we can emerge with a stronger faith and a clearer sense of purpose.

As we begin this Lenten journey, let the Desertas Islands remind us that **even in the most barren places, new life can emerge.** May this season of Lent be a time when we encounter God's presence, allowing ourselves to be transformed and strengthened, ready for the new life that Easter promises.
