PEOPLE HELPING PEOPLE (PHP)




People Helping People is a small project founded in the Chapel of Penha de França by the late Father Bernardino Andrade to help those in need. Our former Bishop D. António once said, "One must find new ways of helping the poor". A very small group of people attending the English Mass decided to do just that after the floods in 2010! In a short period of time, we created partnerships with supermarket chains and restaurants; we have paid dozens of medical prescriptions, we have spent gallons and gallons of petrol riding across the island giving lifts, we have prevented families from going hungry, getting their electricity cut off, running out of gas, losing their homes. We have tried to keep them warm, keep them hopeful, and keep them dreaming.

TODAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS – 5th Sunday of Easter

(Acts 14:21-27; Psalm144(145):8-13; Rev 21:1-5; John 13:31-35)

Last week in Acts the first mission of Paul and Barnabas started. They preached in synagogues, with mixed receptions. Many Jews became Christians. But many did not, stirring up hatred and violence against the Apostles, leaving Paul for dead. Barnabas and Paul then preached to the Gentiles, showing how they could recognise God's activity in nature. Today we hear how this first mission ends, with religious leaders appointed in each church, and a report of "what God had done". The Psalm praises the Lord's kindness and care for creation. In Revelation the promise of salvation described last week is now accomplished. The new Jerusalem comes down adorned as a bride for her marriage with the Lamb, the union of the Messiah with the community of the elect. God dwells with men on earth, after the "former heaven and the former earth" are replaced by a "new heaven and a new earth". God's ancient covenant is fulfilled. In John's Gospel we hear the first of Jesus' farewell discourses at the Last Supper. Jesus is sad to leave his followers. After washing the disciples' feet, Jesus draws out the meaning of this action. He predicts his coming death and gives a new commandment: love one another. 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REFLECTION FOR THE 5TH SUNDAY OF EASTER – By Deacon Tito Pereira





"Love one another as I have loved you" (John 13:34)

When I first started to take my faith seriously, it wasn't a clever argument, an inspiring book, or even a powerful sermon that brought me back to the Church. **It was love.** It was the real, tangible, everyday love I encountered in the people I met at Mass, in the kindness of the parish community, in the way I was welcomed without question. I didn't just hear about God's love - I experienced it. And that experience brought me back home.

In today's Gospel, Jesus gives His disciples what He calls a "new commandment": "Love one another as I have loved you." It's not about ticking boxes or loving out of obligation - it's an invitation to love in the same way Jesus loves us: generously, patiently, forgivingly, and faithfully.

Let's be honest - it's easy to focus on the things that aren't right in life. The disappointments. The things we lack. But that old saying *count your blessings* still has something to say to us. When we pause and take stock, we often find that God has been loving us in all sorts of ways - through friends, through moments of kindness, through quiet strength when life feels heavy.

Many visitors to **Penha de França Chapel** often comment that they feel something special here - a sense of welcome, warmth, and love that is almost hard to put into words. It's not by accident. That's Christ's love, alive and present in the life of this community.

This Easter season, why not make space each day to notice where God is loving you? And from that place, let His love overflow into the lives of those around you. Because, as Jesus reminds us, it's by our love - not by our achievements - that the world will know we belong to Him.
